Message from the BC OGRIS Board of Directors

BC Oil and Gas Research and Innovation Society's (BC OGRIS') support of research and initiatives in the oil and gas sector is a major contributor to understanding, monitoring and mitigating the environmental impacts of operations along with engaging First Nations in environmental oversight and restoration—providing economic opportunities along with information for making informed decisions around environmentally responsible operations.

The BC OGRIS financials remain strong with a solid balance sheet and continued contributions from stakeholders that support our work. Expenditures continue to be monitored to meet accountability expectations of our members and contributors.

Our activities declined this year with the completion of two large restoration initiatives that operated for the past two years. The initiatives involving working with First Nations to restore areas using a combination of ecological and traditional knowledge. The first initiative resulted in the restoration of 154 km of linear features while the other provided support to first nations for projects under their leadership.

Our multi-year support in the monitoring arena continued with monitoring streamflow in small watersheds; air quality in the Farmington area; and seismic activity in northeast B.C. Our support of the Aboriginal Liaison Program continued for its 9th year.

Research activities included the wrap up of several projects looking at analyzing seismic events and modelling potential ground motion from induced seismicity. Research into the natural oxidation of methane continued while our study analyzing low frequency sound from facilities at a distance and under different meteorological factors completed.

Fiscal year 2025 is shaping up to be an exciting year with the next phase of methane research underway starting with analyzing emissions from storage tanks and compressors. We will continue our monitoring support of water, air and seismicity. Our first nations engagement will include supporting the Aboriginal Liaison Program and pilot projects with First Nations in helping to restore orphan wells using traditional knowledge.

Next year will be our 25th year of operations. We will undertake a strategic review and discussion with our members, government, indigenous groups and others in the communities in which we operate around the vision and role for BC OGRIS. We look forward to the findings of this review and the positive impact we can play in a collaborative, sector wide, approach to supporting research and initiatives.



On behalf of the Board of Directors, we thank all the talented and committed researchers, subject matter experts, indigenous participants and other stakeholders involved in our research and initiatives. They are a great team accomplishing great research. We also thank our contributors for recognizing the value of the programs we support and initiatives we fund.

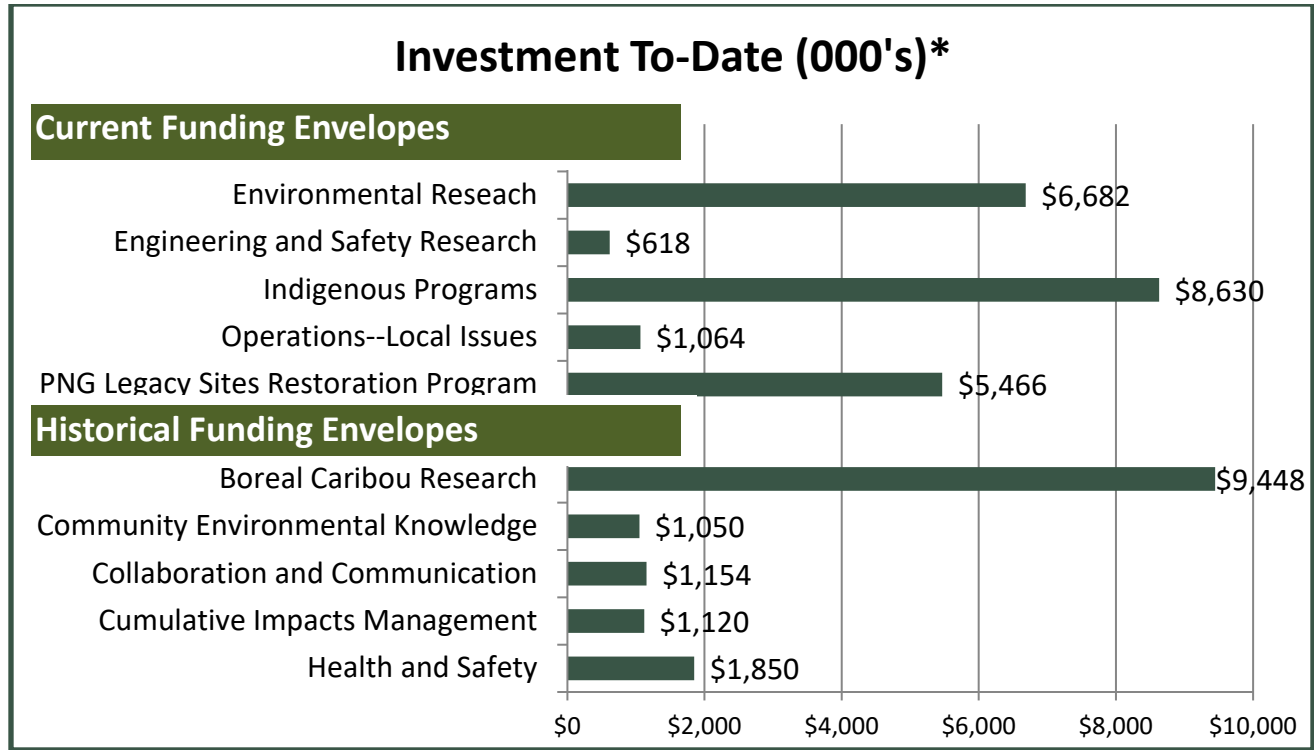

About BC OGRIS (cont.)

This report summarizes BC OGRIS activities in fiscal year 2023/24. Key values of cross-sector representation, accountability and governance with low overhead combine to make BC OGRIS a valued research entity in the B.C. oil and gas sector.

The chart below summarizes over 20 years of research investment since inception in 1999—initially as the Environmental Fund that evolved into the Science, Community and Environmental Knowledge (SCEK) Fund and now BC OGRIS.

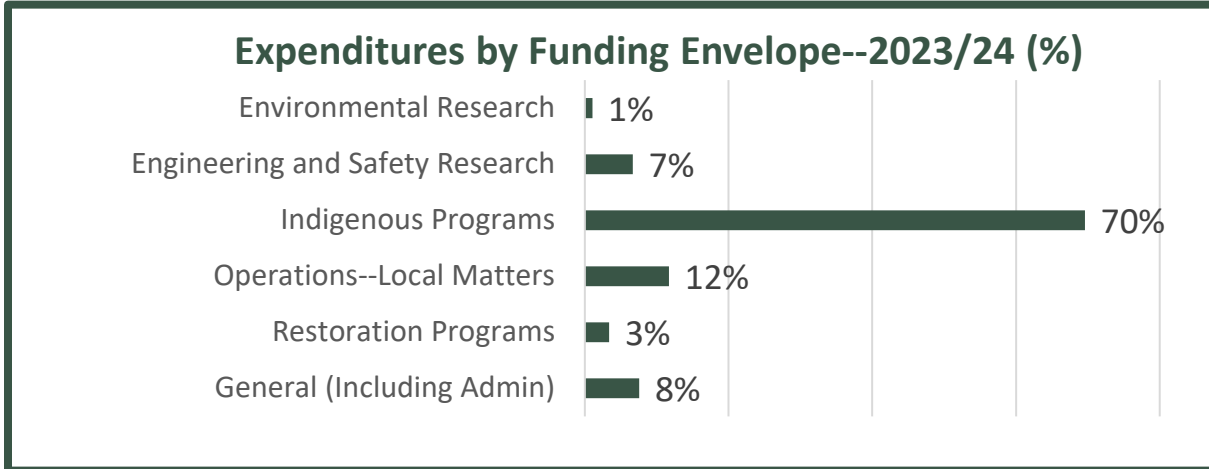

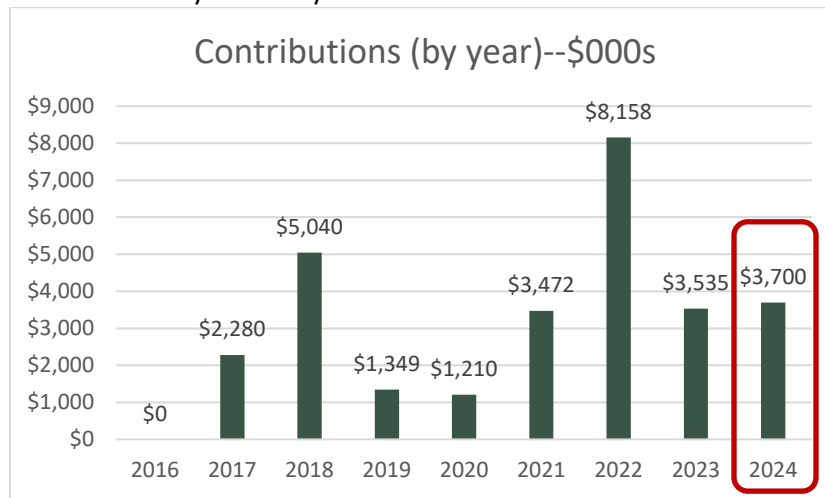


Receive Investments

In 2023/24, BC OGRIS received contributions totalling \$3.7 million:

- The B.C. Ministry of Water, Land and Resource Stewardship provided contributions for specific initiatives in the Indigenous Programs funding envelope.
- The B.C. Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy provided contributions to support oil and gas methane emission research in B.C.

The BC OGRIS Board of Directors targets over 90% of contributions going directly to projects and initiatives with the remainder covering financial and governance activities. This approach of minimizing overhead and fixed assets is attractive to our contributors as demonstrated by continued contributions year over year.



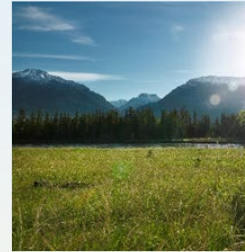

Environmental Research

Addressing knowledge gaps related to the impact of oil and gas activities on methane and climate change, water, air, and other related areas—focused on data collection and avoiding, minimizing and/or mitigating the impact of oil and gas activities in these environmental areas.

In 2023/24, research focused on:

- Methane—preparing the next phase of research for 2024 through 2027. Starting in 2024/25, BC OGRIS will support research identified by the Methane Emissions Research Collaborative—initially in the areas of analyzing emissions from compressors and storage tanks.

- Water—continuing with our 5th year of supporting the monitoring of streamflow in small watersheds in first nation communities.

Engineering and Safety Research

Addressing knowledge gaps in engineering and safety in the areas of pipelines, wells, facilities, and other related areas.

In 2023/24, research focused on:

- Finalizing the initial research into agricultural productivity of soil on restored pipeline corridors.
- Completing the research into the performance of plug and abandonment practices. A second project has spun off from findings of this project—studying the oxidation of fugitive methane in natural soils of Northeast B.C. This second phase of the research will complete in 2024/25.

Indigenous Programs

Building relations and common understanding by engaging Indigenous peoples in the oversight of resource development and management activities.

In 2023/24, BC OGRIS funding supported the following:

- Aboriginal Liaison Program—supporting 10 Liaison positions representing 9 First Nations in carrying out environmental monitoring programs including training for monitoring of disturbances associated with oil and gas development. This includes activities to improve collaboration and communication between industry, regulators, government agencies, and indigenous peoples to assist the First Nations community in understanding how the health and well-being of land, water, wildlife and air values are protected.

- Indigenous Restoration (Pilot) Projects—providing funding support for indigenous peoples to carry out pilot projects to build restoration knowledge and skills in culturally and environmentally appropriate restoration methods. This includes communication activities to explain the purpose and activities involved in restoration.

Operations—Local Matters

A funding envelope for researching and addressing local issues of an operational nature. This includes studies around air monitoring, seismicity, noise, light, traffic densities and other factors related to oil and gas activities at the local (community) level.

In 2023/24, research focused on

- Seismicity—working with the BC Seismic Research Consortium to carry out research to improve the understanding of induced seismicity and hydraulic fracturing. This includes the twelfth year of supporting the Northeast BC Seismic Array Network in monitoring and reporting on seismic activity. Three research projects in the areas of analyzing seismic events and modelling potential ground motion from induced seismicity were completed and a workshop held in Calgary, AB to disseminate the findings.
- Air Monitoring—continuing with our ninth year of supporting the air monitoring station at Farmington, B.C. While the project shows that levels of common air pollutants associated with oil and gas activities are generally very low in the Peace region of B.C., the network continues to provide valuable information on air quality.
- Noise—completing a project to analyze low frequency sound from gas processing and compression facilities considering distance (e.g., 1,000m and beyond) and meteorological factors (e.g., wind, season).

Restoration Programs

Petroleum and Natural Gas (PNG) Legacy Sites Restoration Programs

In 2023/24, the PNG Legacy Site Restoration Program completed its mandate. Nine projects in partnership and involvement with seven B.C. Treaty 8 First Nation were completed between 2022 and early 2023. Restoration projects incorporated both ecological and traditional knowledge in a manner that respected Indigenous culture and Treaty rights. 2023/24 focused primarily on program reporting and communication activities.

Provide Governance and Quality Assurance

Expenditures

Project expenditures in 2023/24 were \$1.2 million—not including the partnership, and corresponding disbursements, to support the Treaty 8 Nations Restoration Fund that wound up in 2023/24.

The annual financial audit of the BC OGRIS was completed by external auditors. The audit statement and the audited financial reports are included at the end of this report and available from the BC OGRIS website at <http://www.bcogris.ca/about>.

Governance

BC OGRIS is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of three directors. The Board of Directors met seven times in 2023/24 to select research investments and fulfil duties such as financial and administrative support services for research projects. The Board places a high value on good governance and maximizing the impact of our contributions by leveraging funding with partners and other research organizations while keeping BC OGRIS specific overhead at three to five percent of project expenditures. Quality assurance over research projects and initiatives to ensure appropriate and applicable research continues to be a high priority for the Board.

Communications Activity

Research findings from BC OGRIS funded projects and initiatives are shared with organizations in the oil and gas industry as well as regulators and government agencies, indigenous peoples and other stakeholders.

Activities to communicate project and BC OGRIS wide information include the following:

BC OGRIS Annual Report—reporting out to BC OGRIS members on the Society’s research activities and accomplishments.

BC OGRIS Website—containing a listing of BC OGRIS projects and initiatives and their deliverables (www.bcogris.ca).

Project/Initiative Specific Communications—disseminating project and initiative specific activities, findings and implications to applicable industry, regulator and government public interest policy and operations personnel (undertaken by the Researcher).

Social Media—disseminating information on projects and funding opportunities via social media.

Conferences, webinars and podcasts—to disseminate findings from our research projects to specialized or target audiences.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Members of BC Oil and Gas Research and Innovation Society

Report on the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of BC Oil and Gas Research and Innovation Society (BC OGRIS), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2024, and the statements of revenues and expenditures and changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of BC OGRIS as at March 31, 2024, and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of BC OGRIS in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

As required by the Societies Act of British Columbia, we report that, in our opinion, the accounting policies applied in preparing and presenting the financial statements in accordance with Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-for-profit Organizations have been applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing BC OGRIS's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate BC OGRIS or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing BC OGRIS's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of BC OGRIS's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on BC OGRIS's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause BC OGRIS to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.



1. Nature of operations

BC Oil and Gas Research and Innovation Society ("BC OGRIS") is a not-for-profit society that incorporated under the Society Act of British Columbia and transitioned into the new Societies Act. BC OGRIS enables results oriented, practical, and relevant applied research to inform environmental, operational, and health and safety matters related to oil and gas exploration and development in British Columbia. BC OGRIS is classified as a not-for-profit organization under the Income Tax Act. As a result, it is not required to pay income taxes.

2. Significant accounting policies

Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO). and include the following significant accounting policies:

Revenue recognition

OGRIS follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable, if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection reasonably assured. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Interest income is recognized as earned.

Project expenses

Project expenses are recognized based on the terms of the agreement. In general, this occurs when interim deliverables are met. Final project expenses are recognized when the final statement of project expenses and the final deliverables have been approved.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with ASNPO requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from these estimates. There are no significant estimates included in these financial statements.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are investments in term deposits that mature within one year and are valued at cost.

Financial instruments

BC OGRIS financial instruments consist of the cash and cash equivalents, accounts receivable, accrued liabilities and accounts payable. BC OGRIS initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value and subsequently measures all financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost.

It is management's opinion that BC OGRIS is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying values due to their short term to maturity, unless otherwise noted.

Within the deferred contributions are funds received that are to be allocated to the general operating fund. These amounts have been deferred to be recognized against future administration costs.

4. Treaty 8 disbursement

After year-end, BC OGRIS paid out amounts to 6 nations totaling \$53,366,536.28 from the Treaty 8 Restoration Fund. The nations included Doig River First Nation, Fort Nelson First Nation, Halfway River First Nation, Prophet River First Nation, Sauteau First Nations, and West Moberly First Nations. The cheques, at \$8,894,422.71 each, all cleared the bank in April of 2024.

5. Commitments

BC OGRIS has entered into several long-term agreements. A commitment is made once the selection committee approves the project and the agreement is signed. Amounts committed to are as follows:
